**About Gas Safety**

Eddie explained that natural gas is actually odorless. It has no smell. A scent is added to the gas. This can help people detect possible leaks and prevent dangerous situations.

"Thank you, Eddie. This is helpful information," said Mrs. Gordon.

It was a very busy day for the Gordons. They are now safe and have learned that if you smell gas, act fast.
